




- Established by Amb. Alfonso T. Yuchengco in 1970 to administer an educational fund for the children of Grepalife employees and sales associates. The program later expanded to include street children and members of the indigenous groups.
- Guided by the principle of Amb. Yuchengco's Cycle of Giving or what he calls the "Social Return on Investments (SROI)', **AYF** undertakes various social developmental programs nationwide focusing particularly in the education, health and nutrition, values formation, and disaster relief.
- Now, AYF is the social development arm of the Yuchengco Group of Companies (YGC) or known as the heart of YGC.

## SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

To provide educational assistance to financially needy but deserving Filipino youth, especially members of indigenous groups, center-based street children, and dependents of YGC employees.

CATEGORIES:

- 1. In-House qualified dependents of YGC employees
- 2. General Public street children under the care of an organized institution, indigent students, and member of the cultural minority groups

BENEFICIARIES: 15,928 scholars since 1970

**BENEFITS:** P37,000 maximum grant/scholar/year

## **CLASSROOM PROJECT**

#### Adopt-A-School Program

To assist in the delivery of better quality education to public schools in the country, particularly in the poverty-stricken provinces.

- 43 classrooms donated since 2005
- 24 school-beneficiaries nationwide









## NATIONAL DISCIPLINE AWARDS

To contribute to the formation of moral values in our society, especially among the youth. A character-based award given to graduating high school students for possessing the core values of discipline, courage, integrity and self-sacrifice.

- 14,668 awardees since 1990
- 468 awardees for SY 2022-2023
- Awardee receives P7,500 one-time cash award, medal & certificate
- Awardees are given a chance to showcase talents in a production number during the awardees' gathering
- 650 target beneficiaries per school year







### **CYCLE PROGRAM**

Championing the Youth for Community Leadership Program

A leadership training and values formation program that instills a keen sense of social responsibility among the National Discipline awardees (NDA) through a two-day workshop and 18-hour of community work.

568 NDAs participated since 2001





### SAINT TERESA OF CALCUTTA AWARD

An annual community service award in partnership with the JCI Manila that gives public recognition to individuals who dedicated at least 25 years of their lives serving the poorest of the poor like Mother Teresa.

- 40 recipients since 1983
- Recipient receives P1M cash award and a plaque
- Half of the cash award is channeled towards projects that the recipient supports





#### For Women Only Project

A health financial assistance project for Filipino women suffering from non-malignant gynecological disorder. It aims to provide assistance to indigent patients to have free access to consultation from medical specialists, laboratory examination, surgical procedures, and hospitalization.

- 201 patient-beneficiaries since 2019
- P105,700 maximum assistance per patient
- 3 FWO projects a year
- 30 target beneficiaries per project





#### **Immunization Project**

A preventive healthcare program to reduce risk of poor health and incidence of illness.

- 13,561 patients served since 2014
- 3 immunization activities per year
- Vaccine: Pnuemo23





#### Medical & Dental Mission

To provide poor Filipinos in far-flung communities with access to quality medical services.

• 70,000+ patients served since 1986

• 5 to 6 missions per year nationwide



#### **Hospital Bed Donation Project**

To contribute to the government's effort of improving the delivery of healthcare services in the country.

In times of calamities, the foundation provides assistance for the relief and rehabilitation projects for the victims of natural disasters and other crisis situations.

# YGC CHRISTMAS FUND DRIVE

#### Gift-Certificate Charity Aid Distribution in partnership with the Caritas Manila

- BENEFICIARIES: 60,000+ families and 29,000+ individuals since 2020
- Poor, low & no-income families, vulnerable groups (elderly, pregnant, nursing mothers, children, PWDs), families facing crisis e.g. unemployment and illness, homeless/street families
- Each family receives P1k worth of gift certificates
- DONORS: YGC, employees & friends











To provide funding to organizations and institutions that support and enable the advancement of patient care and healthcare delivery, promote quality education, and social welfare of people in need.

AYF provides funds for the salaries of the medical staff, medicines, laboratory fees, and supplies.
